EMBLEM



3702nd Basic Military Training Squadron emblems

322nd Training Squadron emblem: Azure, a bald eagle head erased Proper between and surmounted in base by a wreath braced with a ribbon scroll Or, all within a diminished bordure of the first. Attached above the disc a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border. Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The bald eagle symbolizes the unit's dedication to support the Air Force through training. The wreath of laurel represents outstanding achievement by the unit and those it trains. The ribbon banner alludes to the unit's historical participation in operations that have supported the global reach mission. (Approved, 11 Jul 1996)
