OPERATIONS

Constituted in the Organized Reserve on 15 October 1921 as the 400th Squadron (Attack), assigned to the 303rd Attack Group (Fourth Army), and allotted to the Second Corps Area. Initiated on 7 March 1922 at Buffalo, NY. Redesignated as the 400th Attack Squadron on 25 January 1923. Assigned on 1 October 1933 to the 303rd Attack Group (GHQR). Consolidated on 27 November 1936 with the 400th Aero Squadron (Construction) (a WWI unit organized in July 1917 as the 29th Provisional Aero Squadron at Fort Wood, NY; redesignated as the 400th Aero Squadron [Construction] in February 1918; demobilized in July 1919 at Camp Devens, MA; reconstituted on 27 November 1936). Conducted summer training at Mitchel Field, NY. Designated mobilization station was Mitchel Field, NY.
