OPERATIONS

The 615th AMOS was activated on July 22, 1994, and was one of the six original squadrons assigned to the new 615th AMOG. The lineage of the 615th AMOS is traced to Military Airlift Commands 1702nd Mobility Support Squadron (MOBSS). After MAC's transition to Air Mobility Command, the 1702nd was redesignated the 702nd AMOS (Jan. 1, 1993). A year and a half later, the 702nd AMOS was renamed the 615th AMOS. Despite its fledgling existence, the 615th

AMOS directly contributed to the AMOG's success.

In 1996 the 615th AMOG was awarded the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award for the period of July 22, 1994, to July 21, 1996. Then on April 1, 1997, the AMOG underwent a realignment that combined the current 615th AMOS and the 615th Air Mobility Communications Squadron (AMCOMS) into a single squadron. This added an additional 100 personnel to the AMOS and greatly expanded its mission.

Since this realignment the 615th AMOS has supported 36 missions across the globe using a total of 10,915 TDY days for an average of 77 days per squadron member. Even with the reorganization and its heightened operations tempo the AMOS continued its trend for excellence. In 1997 the 615th AMOS won the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award for the period from July 21, 1996, to July 21, 1997.

April 11, 2005, the 615th AMOS was officially redesignated the 15th Air Mobility Operations Squadron as the 615th AMOG inactivated. The 615th Contingency Response Wing replaced the legacy AMOG and the 15th AMOS assumed its new position aligned directly underneath the 15th Expeditionary Mobility Task Force.
