OPERATIONS

The 1st Maintenance Group is responsible for worldwide rapid deployment and employment of combat-ready/mission-capable aircraft in support of Air and Space Expeditionary Force deployments and Operation Noble Eagle missions.

The men and women of the 1st Maintenance Group maximize resources for four on-and off-aircraft maintenance squadrons while overseeing the combat training of maintenance personnel. They also direct sortie generation events and orchestrate long-term fleet health programs for aircraft management. The 1st Maintenance Group is responsible for four squadrons with more than 1950 personnel, a \$193-million flying program budget, \$3-million operations and maintenance budget, more than 58 facilities, nearly 100 work centers and 125 vehicles.
