EMBLEM

Encircled bendwise by a Hunter green palm of peace surmounted by an Air Force blue flight symbol encircled sinister bendwise by two Air Force yellow orbits each with two green atoms. Below an Air Force yellow scroll bordered Air Force blue inscribed in Hunter Green letters.

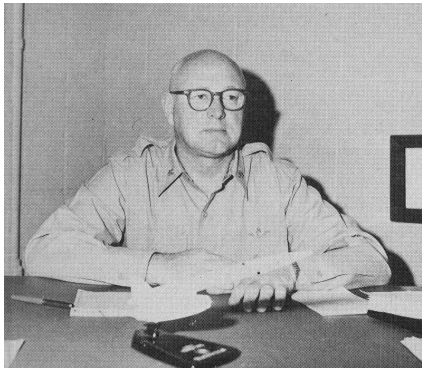
SIGNIFICANCE: The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. The palm of peace encircling the globe alludes to world peace and serves as the flight path for the airborne missile symbol signifying world-wide capabilities. The atoms and orbits through which the missile is flying refers to atomic capability and the advanced electronic status of the squadron. (Approved, 20 May 1964)

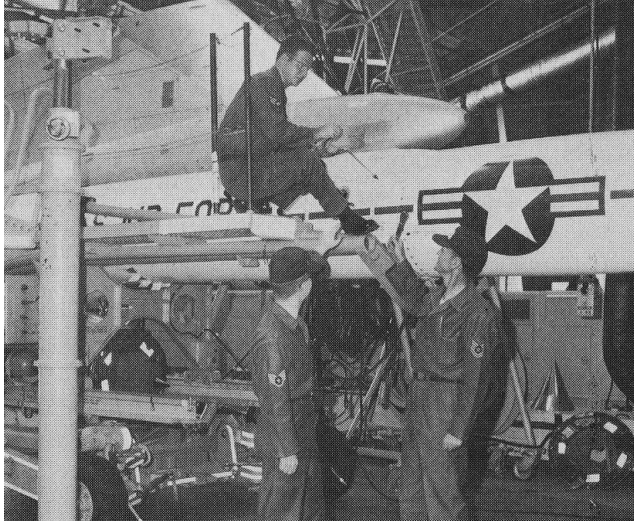

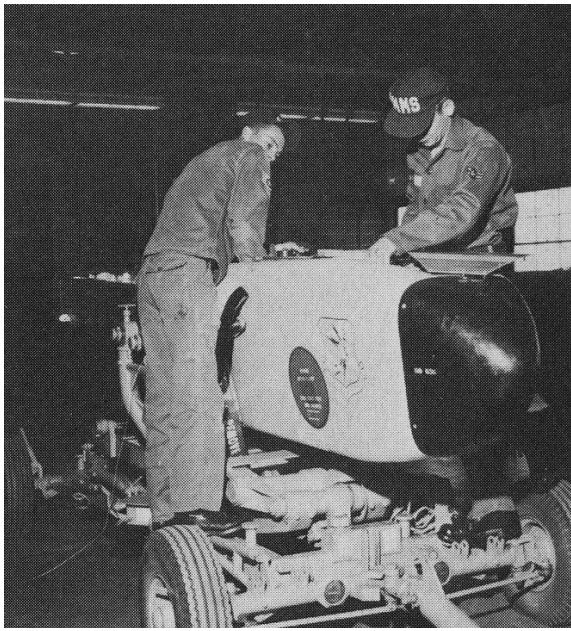

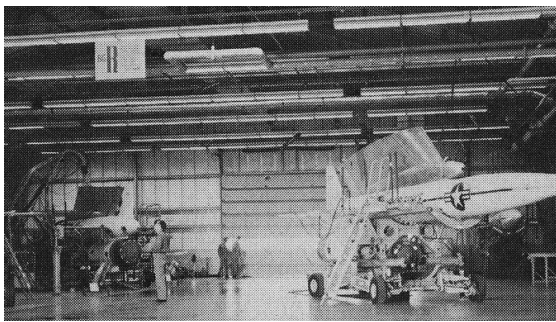
