EMBLEM

The mountain portray the mountainous region surrounding the squadron's local area. The electronic flashes represent the communication mission of the squadron and two bolts indicate the two in the squadron's The rattlesnake's open mouth indicates the constant state of preparedness to communicate, and the zero in the squadron's designation. The rattlesnake represents a reptile indigenous to this area and the three coils around the electronic flashes indicate the three in the squadron's designation. The six rattles on the tail the snake indicate the six in the squadron's designation. The river valley portrays the location of the squadron in the Snake River Valley. The control tower stresses the air traffic control mission as a distinct but integrated squadron.
