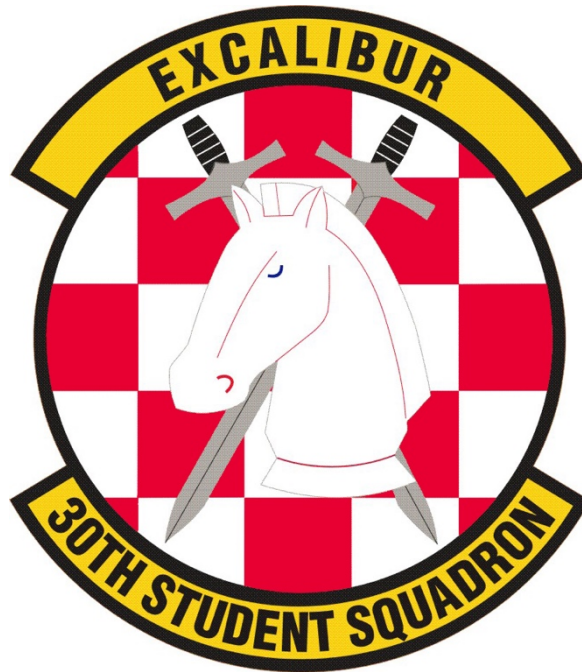

EMBLEM



On a disc chequy Gules and Argent, two swords points to base in saltire Gris, hafted Sable, surmounted by a knight chess-piece of the second detailed of the first, eyed Azure, all within a narrow border Black. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "EXCALIBUR" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "30TH STUDENT SQUADRON" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The chess piece symbolizes the unit as "The Knights." The crossed swords represent two things: Excalibur – the legendary sword of leadership and the sword with which a knight was armed. The checkered background pattern is the battlefield of chess, a universally known test of strategy and skill, symbolic of the global range within which the student will operate.
