EMBLEM











On a blue disc, a light blue globe grid lined yellow with a red stylized aircraft trailing a red contrail arcing right to left in the northern hemisphere, at the North Pole a yellow winged white star, and at lower left a green crate suspended from a green parachute detailed white; all within a narrow yellow border. Attached above the disc a blue scroll edged with a narrow yellow border and attached below the disc a blue scroll edged with a narrow yellow border and inscribed ACHIEVE EXCELLENCE in yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe and aircraft symbolize the worldwide mission of the unit and that the unit is a member of the Military Airlift Command. The north star indicates guidance and direction. The Air Force Reserve emblem depicts the unit's higher echelon. The parachute reflects the unit's historic aerial delivery mission. (Approved, 5 Oct 1987)

OPERATIONS

Air Force Reserve Command's 41 Aerial Port Squadron at Keesler AFB, Miss., dedicated a new \$8.5 million cargo-handling and operations building on the base. "The increased efficiencies associated with training and working in a purpose-built facility will not only benefit the 41 APS but will be a direct benefit to the 403 Wing" said squadron Commander Lt. Col. Michael Grubb at the Oct. 20 ribbon cutting. The Reserve wing is the squadron's parent unit. Located directly on the flight line, the new facility will enable forklifts and K-loaders to shuttle pallets assembled indoors directly to transport aircraft. The two-story, 30,000 square-foot building includes office, classroom, and training space as well as a rolling floor for cargo preparation, and a rigging tower for air-drop parachutes. 2012
