EMBLEM



On a Light Green disc, bordure Red, piped White, a caricatured Black cat carrying its young across a White cloud formation in base; all within a narrow border Scarlet. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Scarlet border and inscribed "41 AIRLIFT SQ" in Scarlet letters. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The mother cat carrying her young safely in her teeth through the clouds represents an unprecedented safety record earned over the Black Cat Trail in the South Pacific during World War II; two years of combat flying without ever losing any passengers or cargo. (Approved, 13 Jan 1943; newest rendition approved, 17 Aug 2007)

OPERATIONS

Included paratroop drops on Nadzab (New Guinea), Noemfoor, Tagaytay (Luzon), Corregidor, and Aparri (Luzon), as well as aerial transportation in South, Southwest, and Western Pacific, during World War II. Berlin Airlift, 1948.

The land blockade of Berlin by the Russians, in 1948, brought the Squadron half way around the world in an operation destined to thwart the infamous attempt of the Communist rulers to force the Allies from the divided city. The 41 Squadron played a major role in the glorious Berlin Airlift. After three years of inactivity, the Squadron again began operations in 1952, at Neubiberg Air Base.

C-130 56-0526 Crashed, mid-air collision with Mystere IV, near Poissy, France, 19 Sep 1958, 7 fatalities.

Transported UN troops to the Congo, 1960. Airlifted personnel and equipment to Southeast Asia from Ryukyu Islands, 1965-1971.

Supported airlift operations in Korea during Pueblo crisis, Jan 1968. Supported Army training and performed rotational duty throughout Europe, since 1971.

Airlifted personnel, special forces and supplies during operations in Grenada, 1983 and Panama, Dec 1989-Jan 1990.

Airlift in Southwest Asia, 11 Aug 1990-21 Mar 1991.

The first C-130J Super Hercules was delivered to an Air Mobility Command active duty unit on 13 March. After accepting the new C-130J, Gen. Duncan McNabb, commander of the Air Mobility Command, flew the aircraft to Little Rock AFB, Arkansas, where it will be operated by 463rd Airlift Group's 41 Airlift Squadron, the third oldest airlift squadron in the US Air Force. The 41 AS, known as the Black Cats, moved from Pope AFB, North Carolina, as part of the Base Realignment and Closure process and officially stood up at Little Rock on 6 April. C-130Js are currently deployed in two combat theaters and are being flown by both US and allied operators. 2007

The last of 16 C-130J transports destined for the 41 Airlift Squadron at Little Rock AFB, Ark., arrived at the base July 7. Maj. Gen. Winfield Scott, commander of Air Mobility Command's 18th Air Force, flew the Super Hercules from Lockheed Martin's assembly plant in Marietta, Ga. He said it was an honor "second to none" to bring this C-130J to Little Rock. The 41 AS is the first active-duty combat-delivery C-130J unit in the Air Force. The unit first deployed some of its C-130Js to Southwest Asia in early 2008. And this past March, elements of the unit began operating from Kandahar Air Field in Afghanistan. According to Lockheed, the 41 AS has racked up 2,600 combat sorties and 4,000 flight hours in the past two years, carrying a total of 56,000 passengers and 3,500 tons of cargo.

Active Duty airmen from the 41 Airlift Squadron at Little Rock AFB, Ark., tackled Nevada's

mountainous terrain in their C-130Js during a training visit to Reno Air National Guard Base. The January trip was in preparation for the airmen's upcoming deployment to Afghanistan, according to a Feb. 4 release from Nevada's 152nd Airlift Wing, an Air Guard unit that operates C-130Hs at Reno. "The mission and terrain here in Nevada is similar to what we'll see overseas, and we can't get this kind of training at home," said Lt. Col. Jim Burgess, 41 AS commander. The Arkansas Super Hercs flew mixed training sorties with Reno's C-130Hs. "We have experience flying in a mountainous environment in our H-model C-130s" that proved valuable to the visiting crews, said Lt. Col. Caesar Garduno, commander of Reno's 192nd AS. Airmen of the 570th Contingency Response Group from Travis AFB, Calif., set up and ran several austere forward bases to give the crews practice in operating from high-altitude unimproved airstrips. 2013

The 41 Airlift Squadron transported more than 100 medical personnel to Orlando, Florida, Sept. 9, 2017, to prepare for Hurricane Irma relief efforts. The 41 AS flew to Dallas and Houston to pick up U.S. Public Health Service Rapid Deployment Force personnel and Disaster Medical Assistance Teams from Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee and Ohio, along with their medical equipment.

"Our mission is to assist in response to Hurricane Irma," said Ronda Lacey, AL-1 DMAT commander. "We're here to help the state of Florida and the people who are in need of medical assistance there. It's an honor to help our country in this critical time. Doctors, registered nurses, mid-level technicians, a dentist and an infectious disease specialist were among the USPHS and DMAT personnel who were pre-staged to support potential relief efforts. The responders brought a variety of skillsets as well as medical equipment such as pharmaceuticals, oxygen tanks, triage kits and basic first aid supplies. USPHS and DMAT teams prepare in advance to respond to critical events, similar to the 41 AS.

"We're ready to respond because of the training we do for this," said Staff Sgt. Efrain Huereque, 41 Airlift Squadron loadmaster. "Even though we don't get to do this often, it's very rewarding; it feels good to help people in need." The relationship between DMAT and USPHS allows them to provide care for those affected by Hurricane Irma. The partnership of these civilian agencies with the Air Force secures mission success for immediate medical care. "It's a joint effort," said Jessica Picanzo, TN-1 DMAT nurse paramedic. "We received a notification 12 hours ago, and now we're in the air. We're able to respond so quickly because of our military partners." 2017
