EMBLEM



On a disc Gules, bearing a smaller inner disc Argent, a stylized dragon volant Or, eyed and emitting flames of the first, grasping in sinister claw a generic weapon bendwise Sable, all within four mullets with alternating facets Red and Tenné, all within a narrow border Blue. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "46TH RANGE SQUADRON" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The dragon represents the principles of leadership and excellence. The dragon's mouth appears incensed and represents strength. The four stars encircling the inner ring represent honor in each of the four services and the highest values of the professionals supporting them. The red ring represents the valor of unit personnel. The generic weapon represents perfection and echoes the 46th Test Wing's mission statement: "The unit provides test and support services enabling warfighters to put the right weapon on the right target at the right time."
