EMBLEM



On a disk Azure, arched in dexter a flight symbol bendwise sinister, a polestar palewise in chief and in sinister a mullet of five points all Argent, detailed Gris, emitting from base a demiglobe Celeste gridlines of the field, surmounted by a winged heraldic beast with the head and neck of a griffin, body, hooves and tail of a horse of the second, detailed of the third, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "50TH OPERATIONS SUPPORT SQ" in Yellow letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The flight symbol and polestar represent operational satellites in the space frontier. The five-pointed star suggests future frontiers to explore. The heraldic beast reflects the unit's support to its parent wing, while characterizing the Squadron's constant command and control duties of Department of Defense satellites that provide communication and data transfer to military units worldwide.
