EMBLEM





56 Aircraft Generation Squadron emblem: On a disc edged with a narrow yellow border, a background divided horizontally into a medium blue sky with a stylized White cloud formation issuing from sinister, above a green arced land area, overall issuing from base four arced vapor trails ascending bendwise, attached in base and dispersing in the top of the disc, each ending in a flight symbol, the colors from dexter to sinister yellow, white, blue and red. Attached above the disc a white scroll edged yellow and inscribed "CAN DO" in blue letters. Attached below the disc a blank white scroll edged yellow. Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The red cross represents strength within the medical arena; it also symbolizes the" blanket" of medical commitment provided by unit personnel to both flying and non-flying military members. The Caduceus, the symbolic staff of a herald, is at the point of the futuristic aircraft. This position signifies that the unit is ready to supply aeromedical support to aircrews, personnel and the environmental elements of space. The earth signifies the worldwide commitment of peacekeeping and the environmental protection of air, water and land. (Approved, 19 Mar 1979)



56 Aircraft Maintenance Squadron emblem: On a disc parted per fess convex and tilted to dexter Celeste and Vert, four contrails conjoined issuing out of sinister base ascending bendwise to diverge in dexter chief, each barbed at the point Or, Argent, Azure and Gules. Couched in sinister chief, a cloud formation Proper, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached below the disc, a Green scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "56 AIRCRAFT MAINTENANCE SQ" in Yellow letters. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The aircraft symbols represent the unit's standards of excellence, valor, trust and determination. The unity of the take off symbolizes teamwork while maintaining the unit's independence, as seen in the dispersion at the top of the arc. (Approved, 30 Jan 2003)

OPERATIONS

The 56 Aircraft Maintenance Squadron is the largest aircraft maintenance squadron in the Air Force. The squadron provides intermediate and flight line maintenance for more than 100 Block 20, 25 and 52 F-16 C/D aircraft. Manned with 850 personnel, the squadron's primary focus is to ensure mission-ready aircraft are maintained to support basic F-16 training for U.S. Air Force active and reserve components, Republic of Singapore Air Force, and Taiwan Air Force pilots. In order to accomplish this task, the squadron is divided into five Aircraft Maintenance Units supporting their associate fighter squadrons. The Aircraft Maintenance Units are the 21st Aircraft Maintenance Unit "Gamblers," the 61st Aircraft Maintenance Unit "Top Dogs," the 62nd Aircraft Maintenance Unit "Spikes," the 309th Aircraft Maintenance Unit "Wild Ducks," and 425th Aircraft Maintenance Unit "Black Widows."
