EMBLEM



56 Supply Squadron emblem and patch: On a blue disc bordered yellow, a pair of yellow hands supporting a brown sphere charged with a white aerospace symbol, all enveloped by two red orbital rings salterwise. Surmounting the arms in base a brown Aladdin's Lamp. Attached below the disc a yellow scroll edged blue and inscribed "We Sustain the Mission" in blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and displays the Air Force colors, golden yellow and ultramarine blue. The Aladdin's Lamp alludes to the magical swiftness with which the organization accomplishes the logistical mission. The hands are symbolic of supporting a celestial body, represents the earth. The lines surrounding the earth depict supply lines covering the four corners of the world but are more symbolic of covering the earth in mission attainment. The aerospace vehicle pointing upward represents that as yet unassigned logistical missions are to be fulfilled in aerospace activity or future space exploration.

56 Logistics Readiness Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, a globe Celeste, gridlined Argent, encircled from behind by an orbit bendwise sinister Gules, trisecting in front of the globe and terminating in three mullets in bend of the third, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "SEMPER"

EXPEDITUS" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "56 LOGISTICS READINESS SQ" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The blue globe represents logistics. The rings and stars circling the globe represent the disciplines of supply, transportation and plans. (Approved, 11 Feb 2003)
