MISSION

The 56 Operations Support Squadron is responsible for providing support to the 56 Fighter Wing training mission. Functions within the OSS include airfield management, air traffic control, intelligence, flight records, current operations, training, life support, weapons and tactics, plans and mobility, and weather. The 56 OSS provides airfield management services, air traffic control, weather forecasting and warning services, weapons and tactics expertise, aircrew training management, aircrew life support training, intelligence support, operations scheduling, and flight records management for a 10-squadron fighter operations group. Additionally, the OSS operates an intelligence formal training unit for the entire F-16 intelligence community and manages an annual flying hour program of over 50,000 hours and 38,000 sorties.

56 Operations Support Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, a starburst of nine points in nombril sinister rotated to dexter Or, surmounted by an eagle volant issuing from sinister chief Yellow, head feathers Argent, eyed Sable, legged Gold Brown, armed and langued Gules. Issuing from dexter base, a wizard in natural colors habited of the sixth and extending his dexter hand toward the eagle, all within a narrow border Scarlet. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "56 OPERATIONS SPT SQ" in Red letters. Attached below the disc a White scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed with "WIZARDS" in Red letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The golden radiance joining the wizard and the eagle is indicative of the myriad missions the unit performs and is a shining example for others to follow. The eagle's outstretched wing signifies the unit's far-reaching impact. The wizard embodies the wisdom and skill of Air Force leadership. (Approved, 2 October 2001)
