#### **EMBLEM**

A white star charged with a red disc in the center and with golden orange stylized wings below the Arabic number "1" in white, all on a blue disc. (Approved, 18 Jan 1944; revised, 10 Dec 1952 and 17 Mar 2005. Additional component status emblem approved, 10 Sep 2008)

A white star 1 1/8 inches (3.86 cm) in diameter charged with a red disc in the center and with golden orange stylized wings below the Arabic number "1" in white 15/16 inch (2.38 cm) in height, all on a blue disc 2 5/8 inches (6.67 cm) in diameter.

### **Symbolism**

The winged star is symbolic of the Army Air Forces and the Arabic numeral "1" indicates the unit's numerical designation. The colors used are those of the Army Air Forces.

The shoulder sleeve insignia was approved on 18 January 1944.

### **OPERATIONS**

First Air Force is one of four numbered air forces assigned to Air Combat Command. It has the responsibility for ensuring the air sovereignty and air defense of the U.S. As the CONUS geographical component of the binational North American Aerospace Defense Command, it provides airspace surveillance and control and directs all air sovereignty activities for the continental U.S.

First Air Force is charged with aerospace warning and aerospace control of the North American Aerospace Defense Command's (NORAD) Continental United States Region. CONR's resources include an air operations center charged with command and control, air defense sectors executing air battle management functions, radar warning systems, fighter aircraft, and aerial refueling tankers used to conduct peacetime and wartime air sovereignty and air defense missions. The 1AF/CONR mission has remained constant. Under CONR's operational control, and sector tactical control, fighters and supporting tankers are launched to intercept and identify unauthorized or unknown aircraft entering the U.S. Air Defense Identification Zone. CONR has also supported the U.S. Customs Service and law enforcement agencies to detect, identify, and track suspected airborne drug smugglers since 1989.

One of the original four numbered air forces formed in the United States in 1940, provided air defense, conducted anti-submarine operations, and trained personnel of newly formed combat units that were deploying overseas. In the first months of World War II, First Air Force was responsible for the air defense of the entire eastern seaboard of the United States. In Jan 1942, the command commenced shore based anti-submarine operations flying B-17s from Langley Field, VA. Later that year, First Air Force turned to the task of training combat air crews for immediate deployment to overseas theaters.

At the end of World War II, First Air Force was again tasked with the air defense of the Northeast. It also continued in the training role, primarily with the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve, until its inactivation on 23 Jun 1958.

First Air Force was reactivated at Stewart AFB, NY, on 20 Jan 1966. During this period, the unit was charged with the air defense of the northeastern United States, Greenland, Iceland and parts of Canada. By Jul 1968, First Air Force had again assumed total responsibility for the air defense of the eastern seaboard, just as it had during World War II. Its second period of service was short lived, and the unit was again inactivated as the result of an air defense reorganization on 31 Dec 1969.

On 6 Dec 1985, the Air Force activated the First Air Force at Langley AFB, VA, and assigned it to Tactical Air Command. Since that time, its mission has been to provide, train and equip combat ready forces for the air defense of the North American continent. Upon its activation, First Air Force was composed of units of the active Air Force and the Air National Guard.

Because of its unique mission and its bi-national responsibilities, First Air Force works closely with the Canadian Forces. Canadian personnel are stationed at First Air Force Headquarters at Tyndall AFB, FL, and at the various regional air defense sectors located throughout the United States.

In October 1997, First Air Force became a primarily Air National Guard numbered air force charged with the air defense of the North American continent. Its commander during the transition, Maj. Gen. Philip G. Killey was previously the director of the Air National Guard.
