## EMBLEM

The emblem represents the support which is given to the 28th Bombardment Wing, by the plane, and to the 44th Strategic Missile Wing, by the missile. The sphere portrays the global aspect of the Air Force's operations, with the microwave dish to represent communications. The fist represents the hand of Air Force commanders who exercise command and control of aerospace power. The electronic flashes represent all forms of aerospace communications which are used to "Provide the Reins of Command." The North Star stresses navigation command and control of aerospace forces. The emblem also includes the Air Force colors of ultramarine blue for the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations and the Air Force yellow for the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel.
