### **EMBLEM**

Azure, a demi-globe issuant from base Celeste gridlined Sable charged with a cross in perspective Gules, the palewise member garnished as a runway Argent and Sable, overall in chief a Caduceus of the fourth detailed Black with the lower portion of the staff Red issuing two speed lines chevronwise from its wings White; all within a diminished bordure Or. Attached below the disc a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The red cross represents strength within the medical arena; it also symbolizes the "blanket" of medical commitment provided by unit personnel to both flying and non-flying military members. The Caduceus, the symbolic staff of a herald, is at the point of the futuristic aircraft. This position signifies that the unit is ready to supply aeromedical support to aircrews, personnel and the environmental elements of space. The earth signifies the worldwide commitment of peacekeeping and the environmental protection of air, water and land. (Approved, 26 Jan 1996)
